Then on Monday, November 20th, we again participated in the Annual Dorm Bash on DMAFB on Monday, November 20th to feed dorm residents before they headed home on leave or celebrated Thanksgiving in the local area. The food was supplied by Brushfire BBQ which is one of our Community Partners and your chapter donated funds to help defray the costs of the event.

November saw the Chief Master Sargeant Carl E. Beck Airmen Leadership School hold its first formal graduation dinner & ceremony since COVID on Thursday, November 21st at The Hilton Garden East. It was a chance to see if my mess dress still fit and participate in this event marking the completion of the first PME for our enlisted airmen and guardians.

Our December meeting was a joint meeting with the Daedalians Old Pueblo Flight12 on Thursday December 7th. The event was a chance to present scholarships to ROTC cadets from the University of Arizona. The remainder of December was filled with several activities that saw participation by chapter members. Chapter's October Program Dr. Josh Appel Chief of Emergency Medicine Southern Arizona VA Health System

Our October chapter meeting guest speaker was Major (Ret) Josh Appel, M.D. Dr. Josh Appel is currently serving



as Chief of Emergency Medicine at the Southern Arizona VA in Tucson AZ. He is also an Associate Professor of Emergency Medicine at The University of Arizona College of Medicine, where he was the Medical Director for Adult and Trauma Services for 6 years.

Maj. Appel was commissioned in 2007 after serving 12 years as an Air Force Pararescue Specialist in both active duty and Air Force Reserves. He attended the

Aerospace Medicine course in San Antonio Texas in 2008, and became the Flight Surgeon for the 306th Rescue Squadron, the same Squadron where he served as a Pararescue Specialist.

In May of 2005, then Master Sargent Appel, volunteered to deploy to Afghanistan in support of OPERATION Enduring Freedom. Just days after graduating from The University of Arizona's College of Medicine, he boarded a plane to the war zone to provide Combat Search and Rescue coverage for US and allied forces. When not on alert for Combat Search and Rescue (CSAR) duties, he volunteered at the Kandahar base hospital. It was during this deployment that Maj. Appel was involved with the rescue and recovery of the men of **Operation Red Wings**.

Operation Red Wings, informally referred to as the Battle of Abbas Ghar, was a joint military operation conducted by the United States in the Pech District of Kunar Province, Afghanistan. It was carried out from late-June to mid-July 2005 on the slopes of a mountain named Sawtalo Sar, situated approximately 20 miles (32 km) west of the provincial capital of Asadabad. The operation was intended to disrupt the activities of local Taliban-aligned anticoalition militias (ACM), thus contributing to regional stability and thereby facilitating the September 2005 parliamentary election for the National Assembly of Afghanistan. At the time, Taliban ACM activity in the region was carried out predominantly by a small group led by a local man from Nangarhar Province known as Ahmad Shah, who had aspirations of achieving regional prominence among Muslim fundamentalists. Consequently, Shah and his group were one of the primary targets of the American military operation.

A team of four Navy SEALs, tasked with surveillance and reconnaissance of a group of structures known to be used by Shah and his men, were ambushed by Shah and his group just hours after inserting into the area by fast-roping from an MH-47 Chinook helicopter. Three of the four SEALs were killed during the ensuing battle, and one of the two quick reaction force (QRF) helicopters sent in for their aid was shot down by an RPG-7 fired by Shah's insurgents, killing all eight U.S. Navy SEALs and all eight U.S. Army Special Operations aviators on board.

The operation then became known as **Red Wings II** and lasted approximately three more weeks, during which time the bodies of the killed SEALs and Army Special Operations aviators were recovered and the only surviving member of the initial SEAL team, Marcus Luttrell, was rescued.

Josh detailed his participation in those rescue and recovery operations, including his identification of Marcus Luttrell,

before Luttrell was loaded into the helicopter for extraction. This action resulted in the book "Lone Survivor: The Eyewitness Account of Operation Redwing and the Lost Heroes of SEAL Team 10" and the subsequent movie "Lone Survivor".

Josh completed a residency program in Emergency Medicine at Albany Medical College and returned to The University of Arizona as faculty in 2009. During this time, Dr. Appel began a national fundraiser called Memorial Day Murph that was based on a workout done by Michael Murphy he called 'Body Armor'. This started as a CrossFitbased fundraiser but has blossomed into a global event done by thousands of people every year and is now called The Murph Challenge. Lt. Michael Murphy was the leader of the four man surveillance SEAL team during Operation Red Wings and was one of the three killed in action.

After returning to Tucson and working at The University of Arizona for 9 years, Dr. Appel transitioned to the VA and became Chief of Emergency Medicine at the Southern Arizona VA Health Care System. This move gives Josh the opportunity to help improve the care provided to our Veterans and continue his commitment to serve, by caring for those who served.

Josh lives in Tucson with his wife Angela, three daughters and two dogs.

Chapter's December Program Cadet Abigail Swalander AFROTC Scholarship Award

December's chapter meeting was a joint meeting with The Daedalians Old Pueblo Flight 12 at the American Legion Post 42 on December 7th. The meeting was an opportunity to recognize ROTC cadets from the University of Arizona with scholarships. The Daedalians scholarships were presented to ROTC cadets from the Army, Navy and Air Force who are looking to pursue careers as military aviators. Your AFA chapter's scholarship is presented to a cadet pursuing a non-aviation career.

This year's recipient of the \$750 scholarship is Cadet Abigail Swalander, who was selected to be a human factors/systems engineer but is applying to be a Physician's Assistant for the Air Force. Her degree is in Biomedical Engineering and she was the Cadet Wing Vice Commander last semes-

STARBASE has a partnership with PTC who is a leading software corporation. Their education team provides amazing tasks for our STARBASE students to accomplish. It is the same platform engineering design teams are using from companies around the globe, such as Volvo, Caterpillar and Faurecia.

STARBASE Arizona appreciates our Davis-Monthan Community. The time and expertise each member invests in our students is profound and leaves a positive footprint for these future STEM leaders. Military personnel show students how their careers connect to each of the STEM fields. They also assist students with launching bottled rockets which is definitely a favorite. Since we launched in August,167 military personnel have logged in nearly 148 volunteer hours.

"A Little Bit of History" Convair YB-60




The Convair YB-60 was a prototype heavy bomber built by Convair for the United States Air Force in the early 1950s. It was a purely jet-powered development of Convair's earlier mixed-power B-36 Peacemaker.

On 25 August 1950, Convair issued a formal proposal for a swept-winged version of the B-36 with all-jet propulsion. The Air Force was sufficiently interested that on 15 March 1951, it authorized Convair to convert two B-36Fs as the B-36G. Since the aircraft was so radically different from the existing B-36, the designation was soon changed to YB-60.

The YB-60's unofficial competitor for an Air Force contract was Boeing's B-52 Stratofortress. Convair's proposal was substantially cheaper than Boeing's, since it involved modifying an existing design rather than starting from scratch. Like the B-52, it was powered by eight Pratt & Whitney J57-P-3 turbojets mounted in pairs in four pods suspended below the wing. Prior to this engine configuration Convair had evaluated a six-turboprop design and one with 12 J47 engines.

Convair YB-60 made its maiden flight on 18 April 1952. The Boeing YB-52 beat the Convair aircraft into the air by three days. The YB-60 was approximately 100 mph slower than the YB-52 and also had significant handling problems, due to its controls having been designed for slower operating speeds. The flight test programs were canceled on 20 January 1953, with 66 flying hours accumulated. The second prototype was nearing completion but its engines had not been installed and other equipment installations had not been completed. Since Convair completed their prototype contract satisfactorily, both YB-60s were formally



accepted by the Air Force in 1954. The operational aircraft never flew again, and both airframes were scrapped by July.

An airliner adaptation of the YB-60 was proposed by Convair, but its wingspan and weight would have required unacceptable airport infrastructure changes beyond those required for the upcoming Boeing 707. The company decided to pursue the Convair 880 series airliner instead.
