Chapter's October Meeting

Chapter 105 Executive vice President Bryan Foulk was our guest speaker for the October 24th chapter meeting. He spoke about his multiple roles in AFA Advocacy and Legislative Affairs. Bryan wears multiple hats that keep him very busy working with the AFA Board of Directors, providing input from the AFA Field, working on the AFA Advocacy Committee and various subcommittees, working with the AFA Mitchell Institute and finally with our friends in Congress.



In addition to being the chapter's Executive VP, he also is our chapter VP for Advocacy as well as for AFA Arizona. In these roles, he gets involved with local, state and national elected officials to provide input into their decision making with respect to national defense issues, down to support at local and state level for military installations and personnel within Arizona.

Bryan has been instrumental in crafting inputs from the AFA for several of the past National Defense Authorization Acts (NDAA). NDAAAs are a US federal law which specifies the budget, expenditures and policies for the DoD for a specific year. The NDAA is an annual act of Congress that redefines the US military budget. His input is based upon discussions with members of Congress and their staffs, senior Air Force & DoD officials, and where applicable, state and local officials. His success is due to his personal relationships developed over many years.

His inputs for FY2026 and earlier were:

Pay raises for all with bigger percentage increase for junior enlisted: Accomplished; Twice

Fund ACE: Accomplished

CDC support for hiring and matching civilian pay:

Accomplished

Increase F-35 purchases: Accomplished

Increase Space Force funding: Accomplished

Increase Space awareness funding: Accomplished

Increase F-15EX funding and buys: Accomplished

Slow retirements of old aircraft: Sort of accomplished

Increase the buy of B-21s: Accomplished

For FY2027, the following are proposed:

Recapitalize the AF, ANG and Reserve

Why? There will be 9 ANG and Reserve bases closed in the next 5 years if the current retirement pace continues without any increases in new aircraft procurement and/or a slowdown in retirements with an increase in sustainment dollars. Loss of over 500 fighters from current numbers.

Increase Space Force size by 1000 billets

The Space Force is tasked to perform an ever-increasing number and scope of missions and cannot perform without an increase in personnel. (FY26, which is not finalized, does have a section for an increase in 400 billets, which was an AFA proposal)

Add more capacity to CDCs

Almost every base has long waiting lists for child care services. As goes the war fighter goes the well being of the family.

Continue the Buy of C2 platforms including the E-7

All commanders state that their number one need is C2, The A8 and the Administration cancelled the E-7 program, but Congress sees the need and is financing the purchase of E-7s in the FY26. AFA Advocacy works!!

Thank you Bryan for your tireless efforts in support of AFA's advocacy efforts to support and strengthen the United States Air Force and the men and women serving every day to keep America free and safe.

Chapter's December Meeting

The December 2025 Chapter meeting was a joint meeting with Daedalians Flight 12 on Thursday, December 4th at the American Legion Post 36. The purpose of the meeting was to present scholarships to ROTC cadets from the University of Arizona. As in the past, the Daedalians presented their scholarships to cadets that are candidates for a flying career while your chapter presents a scholarship to a cadet choosing a non-flying position in the Air Force. This year, the Daedalians presented their scholarships to Navy ROTC MIDN Justin Obregon and AFROTC Cadet Colton Hackenyos. The Chapter 105 scholarship was presented to Cadet Josiah Alonzo Parker.

C/Lt. Col Parker is VERY active in both AFROTC and life in general. Convair F-102 Delta Dagger



The **Convair F-102 Delta Dagger** is an interceptor aircraft designed and produced by the American aircraft manufacturer Convair. A member of the Century Series, the F-102 was the first operational supersonic interceptor and delta-wing fighter operated by the USAF.

The F-102 was designed in response to a requirement, known as the *1954 Ultimate Interceptor*, produced by USAF officials during the late 1940s. Its main purpose was to be the backbone of American air defences and to intercept approaching Soviet strategic bomber fleets (primarily the Tupolev Tu-95) during the Cold War. It used an internal weapons bay to carry both guided missiles and rockets. On 23 October 1953, the prototype YF-102 performed its maiden flight; however, it was destroyed in an accident only nine days later. The second prototype allowed flight testing to resume three months later, but results were disappointing: as originally designed, the aircraft could not achieve Mach 1 supersonic flight.

To improve its performance prior to quantity production commencing, the F-102 was redesigned, its fuselage was reshaped in accordance with the area rule while a thinner and wider wing was also adopted. Flight testing demonstrated sufficient performance improvements for the USAF to be persuaded to permit its production; a new production contract was signed during March 1954. The *F-102C* tactical attack model, equipped with several improvements, including a more powerful engine and Gatling gun, was proposed but not ultimately pursued. A total of 1,000 F-102s were built, both for the USAF and a handful of export customers.

By the 1960s, USAF F-102s had participated in a limited capacity in the Vietnam War as a bomber escort and even in the ground-attack role. The aircraft was supplemented by McDonnell F-101 Voodoos and, later on, by McDonnell Douglas F-4 Phantom IIs.

It is a true honor to serve as a community partner with the Tucson Chapter 105 of the



Air and Space Forces Association. The AFA's dedication to advocating for our Air and Space Forces, honoring our heritage, and supporting Airmen, Guardians, and their families in the Tucson area is invaluable—

especially for those stationed at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base (DMAFB).

My own journey in service began with a commission through the Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps at the University of



Texas at Austin (Hook 'Em Horns!). I served as an active-duty officer in the U.S. Air Force from 1990 to 1996 at Offutt AFB, Nebraska. During that time, I worked as an acquisition officer on nuclear planning computer and communication systems, and later as an aerospace engineer modeling threat fighter weapon

Lt Kelly systems. Though my active-duty tenure was just six years, it instilled in me a profound appreciation for the sacrifices made by military members and their families to protect our nation.

After separating from the Air Force, I transitioned to a long career at Raytheon Missile Systems here in Tucson, continuing to contribute to defense as an engineer, program manager, and engineering leader. In 2022, I retired after decades of rewarding work. But retirement didn't sit well for long—I needed a way to stay active and keep giving back to the community. In 2024, I obtained my real estate license and quickly became an affiliate with Homes for Heroes.

Homes for Heroes is a national nonprofit founded shortly after the 9/11 attacks by real estate professionals in Minnesota, with a mission to give back to those who serve our communities. As a Homes for Heroes real estate affiliate, I partner with clients who qualify as "heroes"—including active-duty military, veterans, first responders, healthcare workers, and educators. When a hero buys or sells a home through me, they receive significant Hero Rewards after closing: approximately \$700 for every \$100,000 of the home's price

from the real estate side alone. I also collaborate with affiliated loan officers who provide additional savings, often resulting in average total rewards of \$3,000 for a single transaction (or more when combining buy and sell, plus lender credits).

This is our tangible way of saying "thank you" for your service and sacrifice.

Additionally, the related Homes for Heroes Foundation is a separate nonprofit that awards grants to organizations supporting heroes with housing-related needs—from minor home repairs to emergency assistance and larger initiatives. My personal goal is to help direct as many of these foundation grants as possible to southern Arizona, benefiting local Airmen, veterans, and other heroes right here in our community.

I am passionate about supporting the outstanding men and women at DMAFB and their families. If you have ideas on how I can better assist through real estate services—whether for PCS moves, buying a first home, or selling before a new assignment—please reach out. Let's work together to make homeownership easier and more rewarding for our Tucson Air and Space Forces community.

The 25-26 academic year for DoD STARBASE Arizona has already been filled with numerous STEAM adventures and the year isn't over yet! Nearly 440 students have attended and were provided premier instruction in science, technology, engineering, arts/design and mathematics (STEAM). Students attend from the Vail, Amphi, Sunnyside and Tucson Unified School Districts. The goal is to inspire and engage students in unforgettable educational experiences within a discovery/inquiry based environment.

A very successful Fall Academy occurred the first week in October. Fall and Summer Academies gives the program an opportunity to support our Davis-Monthan community. Spots are reserved for our military dependents.

STARBASE Arizona Advanced supported 7th graders in Forensic Science at Corona Foothills Middle Schools this past quarter. A culminating event occurred in December where parents were invited to watch their child solve a mock crime using their newly learned forensic skills. Several of our volunteers generously shared their time, discussing careers related to forensic science and providing guidance as students engaged in challenging tasks..



STARBASE Arizona continually cultivates strong partnerships within our community. The team has participated in Sabino High School's Science Night, Andrada High School's *Girls Who Code* event, and Mica Mountain High School's Science and Technology Night. Interacting with these school communities has been incredibly rewarding.



STARBASE Arizona is grateful to be part of inspiring our youth in STEAM and equally grateful for the support from our partner districts, and military community. 109 military personnel at Davis Monthan volunteered 125 hours thus far by assisting students with launching bottled rockets and sharing how their careers connect to each of the STEAM fields. The team remains committed to empowering our youth and building strong community connections in STEAM education. A valuable investment in tomorrow's STEAM innovators.

AFA's Strategic Advocacy Objectives

1. Ensure combat readiness in Air, Space, and Cyberspace.

Fully fund readiness accounts to ensure Department of the Air Force personnel are the world's most ready, most capable, and most effective Air & Space Forces, and that they have the instruction, training hours, spare parts, weapons, and fuel and other logistics support systems to meet all aspects of the National Defense Strategy.

2. Define and articulate requirements for the Department of the Air Force to execute the National Defense Strategy.

Make clear the force size, systems, and weapons required to execute the nation's defense strategy in the air, in space, and in cyberspace, and ensure joint warfighting requirements established by the Combatant Commands are unconstrained by budget restrictions.

3. Recapitalize and modernize the Air and Space Forces.

Today's Air Force is the smallest and oldest it has ever been. Our nascent Space Force lacks the scale to ensure continuous operations in the face of growing threats. The nation must invest in these two branches of the Department of the Air Force to ensure their modernization and resilience under attack. To do so, investment must end 30 years of underfunding relative to the Departments of the Army and Navy and ensure investment commensurate with the requirements to ensure air and space superiority.

4. Invest in and develop advanced technologies to ensure U.S. Air and Space resilience and superiority in the future.

The United States must invest in new weapons, systems, and capabilities to deter and, when necessary, defeat adversaries that threaten the interests of the United States and its allies. We must likewise continue to develop and field the most promising advanced technologies in pursuit of air and space superiority and the technological advantage and overmatch necessary to deter war.

5. Invest in and support our people, our most valuable asset.

Support Airmen, Guardians, and their Families, recognizing their unique contributions to U.S. National security; treat retirees and veterans with the dignity and respect their service and sacrifices deserve; build the skilled and talented civilian workforce needed to support our warfighters in all their endeavors through public and STEM education and core scientific research programs.

- **SUPPORT** Airmen, Guardians, and the families of the Total Air Force and Space Force, including Active Duty, National Guard, Reserve, civilians, families, and members of the Civil Air Patrol.
